Principals' Retreat

Last week I spent three days at Bowral at the Annual Principals' Retreat. The retreat was facilitated by Archbishop Christopher Prowse and it was a very special time of prayer and reflection. The theme of the retreat was 'Into the Heart of Mercy'.

What do principals do on retreat? We started each day with the Prayer of the Church and in a number of sessions the Archbishop reflected on the lives and

writings of Blessed Mother Teresa,
Blessed John Henry Newman and St
Therese of Lisieux. He also gave
examples of mercy compassion – mercy
in action. One of the more graphic
stories was of his encounter with a
prisoner in the maximum security
section of Goulburn Gaol and the effect
on the prisoner when the Archbishop
prayed for him.

We spent a lot of time in silence. The Archbishop used sound pedagogy in building up the times of silence over time. We started with 5 minutes and ended up sitting for 20 minutes in complete silence. A challenge for any group but particularly hard work for 56 principals and 22 Catholic Education Senior Officers!

Not to labour the point but it is amazing what one 'hears' during periods of silence. One of the things I did on retreat was to pray for the SFX community.

The ceremony was held at the Tomb of the Unknown Australian Soldier and was not only a unique experience- but a moving one. The Tomb of the Unknown Soldier symbolises all the Australians who have served and given their lives in the name of Australian integrity, honour, and tranquillity. The Wreath Laying Ceremony honours these soldiers and shows respect to the current members of the Australian Armed Forces. Science and religion both explore what it means to be human...

Science without religion is lame, religion without science is blind. Albert Einstein

A father wrote recently that he was concerned for his own son's religious wellbeing. His son was beginning to do what all good students do, develop independent thinking and questioning the veracity of his faith. The son was beginning to see the facts presented in Science as being in opposition to his previously strong faith. We should never be afraid to question. Not questioning leads to ignorance and compliance, without regard for whether accepted beliefs and norms are valid, just or founded in truth. Questioning leads to wonder, to testing assumptions, to rejecting false ideologies, to discoveries and enlightenment. Questioning is something we should encourage in our students. In encouraging students to question and challenge established beliefs and assumptions, we are empowering our students to become critical and compassionate thinkers, capable of making extraordinary contributions to their world through the use of intellect, reason, empathy, spiritual awareness and through physically reaching out to others. By embracing their humanity, recognising their gifts and talents, and using these gifts and talents to promote truth, justice and compassion, students are acknowledging that they are part of a bigger picture, a bigger story, whether that story be religious, spiritual or scientific. We call this bigger picture, *Cosmology*.

In RE we explore Cosmology – the big question of where we come from, why we are here, and what is our purpose in life? Scientific theory tells us that the universe comes from the Big Bang. The creation story in Genesis tells us that we are created in the image and love of God. Science and religion both explore what it means to be human. Science gives us the truth of our material body. Religion interprets the truth of Science in the light of our understanding of what it means to be human – to be relational, loving and compassionate. There is no disconnect. In fact, Science does a great service to Religion. It empowers it, challenges ideas and ideologies that can be no longer supported and challenges Religion to give meaning and purpose to our human existence in a modern context. The Vatican even has a Pontifical Academy of Science which has some amazing research and refers to world experts in scientific fields in determining the impact of scientific research on the human person and human experience. That human existence is explored beautifully in a documentary we showed Year 11s last week – *The Human Experience*. If you want to be uplifted, spend an hour and fifteen minutes watching "The Human Experience" - you can find it here... https://vimeo.com/57076124. Year 11s found it challenged what was really important to a meaningful life. One perceptive lad commented "we have everything and they have nothing, yet they seem so much happier, why is that?"

That question is beautifully explored in a short story about a fisherman and a wealthy man. I am sure it will resonate with all the fisher folk in our College community.

An American investment banker was at the pier of a small coastal Mexican village when a small boat with just one fisherman docked. Inside the small boat were several large yellowfin tuna. The American complimented the Mexican on the quality of his fish and asked how long it took to catch them.

The Mexican replied, "Only a little while". The American then asked why didn't he stay out longer and catch more fish. The Mexican said he had enough to support his family's immediate needs. The American then asked, "But what do you do with the rest of your time?"

The Mexican fisherman said, "I sleep late, fish a little, play with my children, take siestas with my wife, Maria, stroll into the village each evening where I sip wine, and play guitar with my amigos. I have a full and busy life." The American scoffed, "I am a Harvard MBA and could help you. You should spend more time fishing and with the proceeds, buy a bigger boat. With the proceeds from the bigger boat, you could buy several boats; eventually you would have a fleet of fishing boats. Instead of selling your catch to a middleman you would sell directly to the processor, eventually opening your own cannery. You would control the product, processing, and distribution. You would need to leave this small coastal fishing village and move to Mexico City, then LA and eventually New York City, where you will run your expanding enterprise."

The Mexican fisherman asked, "But, how long will this all take?"

To which the American replied, "15 – 20 years."

"But what then?" Asked the Mexican.

The American laughed and said, "That's the best part. When the time is right you would announce an IPO and sell your company stock to the public and become very rich, you would make millions!"

"Millions - then what?"

The American said, "Then you would retire. Move to a small coastal fishing village where you would sleep late, fish a little, play with your kids, take siestas with your wife, stroll to the village in the evenings where you could sip wine and play your guitar with your amigos." http://bemorewithless.com/the-story-of-the-mexican-fisherman/

Year 12s have been exploring what it means to exercise moral courage as part of living an ethical life. Last week they viewed the recently released documentary, *He Named Me Malala*. An inspiring story about the life of Malala Yousefzai, the young woman shot in the head by the Taliban in Pakistan as punishment for speaking out for the education of girls. There were parts of that documentary when the silence was so intense you could hear the compassion circuits whirring in the room. I commend the Year 12s for the attention they paid to the story of a young woman, now only a year older than themselves. A young woman, just like them in many ways. When she is not speaking out for the rights of girls to be educated, or working with refugees, despite the fact that she is a refugee herself, she is struggling with her marks in Physics and Biology. Just like the young man responded to *The Human Experience* documentary by asking, why are we so unhappy with so much, we need to ask are we making the most of our educational experience? Are we using it to become the best people we can be, to be able to make a positive contribution to our world.

Year 12s have also been challenged by the story of *Wallaby;* David Pocock in recent *Australian Story* episodes. He is a role model and ambassador for his sport. The story is about his faith and willingness to live an ethical life, especially in regard to animal rights, social and environmental justice and education. He became this role model despite experiencing traumatic personal challenges in his homeland of Zimbabwe. If you are a Rugby fan, and have not had the chance to see this show, do yourself a favour and watch it, preferably with your family. The discussion you will have about how to live a meaningful and ethical life will be invaluable for your family and encouraging for your children. "There is no point in having strong beliefs about something if you are not going to do something about it."





Information for Intending Youth Exchange Applicants



Applications for Exchange Starting January 2017

Initial applications must be submitted to your local Rotary club. This club must agree to sponsor your nomination to the district youth exchange committee. You can find and contact your local Rotary Club by visiting www.rotaryd9710.org.au

Initial interviews by local Rotary Clubs will be conducted during April. The Rotary Club may pass details of applicants to other Rotary clubs in the district to maximise chances of selection.

Applications should be lodged with your local Rotary Club before 15 April 2016.



The Person

Applicants should be no younger than fifteen and no older than seventeen years and six months, as at 31 December before exchange. They should be of good character and be able to demonstrate good academic records as well as an understanding of and interest in their community. A good knowledge of Australia and its social and political structures is highly desirable. The ideal Rotary exchange student will be well presented and well spoken, a person who is motivated and who motivates others.

The student will be a person with strong interest in the world and in people, who is capable of mixing freely with others of all types, age groups and walks of life. The main purposes of the exchange are to be a successful ambassador and to bring back to your society the benefits of the foreign culture you will absorb. This position will require long hours and dedication but is a rewarding experience and considered a launching pad for the rest of life.



As a student exchange, the programme is designed for those still at school and ideally applicants should not have completed school at the time of departure. They would normally complete studies on return. However students who are now in year 12 and within the age limits will be considered and have often been successful.



Applicants who are successful in gaining endorsement at the initial interview by a Rotary Club will be invited (along with their parents) to the selection interviews by the district youth exchange committee on Saturday 28 May 2016 in Canberra. This form together with the results of the interviews will be the basis for selection to the programme which is a competitive selection process with the most suitable applicants (in the opinion of the district youth exchange committee) being offered the available places. Selection is not guaranteed. A final application form will be completed after the district

The district committee will proceed to place those selected with host Rotary clubs overseas. Meanwhile you will attend a number of orientation and briefing weekends and will be thoroughly prepared for your exchange year with the object of travelling abroad in January.
