As we end the school year, we begin the Liturgical year.

The Feast of Christ the King always marks, for me, the end of one drama cycle and the beginning of a new one, with the invitation to reflect, renew and restore our faith and relationships.

As we prepare to wind down, we are called to enter into a time of reflection, withdrawal into our hearts, and seriously consider the role of the incarnation of Jesus in our own lives

The season of Advent, challenges us to follow, anew, the life of Christ the King and the life of the Christ Child, and enter wholeheartedly into the birth of the child king.


In Roman times, the advent (arrival) of the Emperor into a city would arouse great fear and expectation. He would dispense justice and rewards. People prepared themselves for it.

In the Church year, Advent is the time we await the coming of Christ, remembering the birth of Jesus and preparing for the coming of God into our lives and the world.

It is a time of joyful waiting. Of waiting for a God of peace, not a God of war, a God of love, not an oppressive and capricious God.

The first readings in most Masses during Advent are taken from the prophecies of Isaiah. They were written in hard times of war, dodgy alliances and injustice.

They see the world as it is but are filled with hope, and a deep sense of God's presence in the natural world, they are expressions of longing during times of conflict for peace, conflict resolution and reconciliation.



They express the conviction that relationship to God affects the whole environment and not just our hearts.

This longing and vision of hope is most beautifully expressed in the reading from Micah 4:2, which is also found in Isaiah 2:

"Come, let us go up to the mountain of the LORD, to the temple of the God of Jacob.

He will teach us his ways,
so that we may walk in his paths."

This reading speaks of threats and counter-threats among nations. As it was in the Ancient times, so it is with us. Witness North Korea, Myanmar, The Middle East, to name a few.

Martin Luther King once said, there can be no justice without peace and there can be no peace without justice. Dr. King's formulation contains no threats of violence, veiled or otherwise. Injustice anywhere, said King, is a threat to justice everywhere." This advent, let us prepare for Christmas and the coming of the Christ Child through sincerely praying for peace.

Students in Years 7 to 11 have received their Semester Reports via email. Year 12 students will collect their ACT Senior Secondary Certificate and their ATARS on the 14 December (from 10am in the Hub). We are expecting some very pleasing results for this hardworking year group.

Receiving certificates and reports can bring feelings of joy and pride but in some cases, it can also cause concern, frustration or uncertainty. In either case, the end of year marks a time for reflection, to set goals and to think about the future. The role of parents and carers is important, in helping to motivate and encourage the student and help them focus on their areas of success and also to plan for improvement in others. Positive motivation from parents and carers is a great way to build self-esteem and can lead to more success in the future.

Some suggestions for discussion about reports are:

- Talk to the student calmly, go through the results and ask how they are feeling about it.
- Ask them questions like: "what can we do at home to help you focus on homework and study?", "How can I help you manage your workload?", "What strategies do you think will make a difference?"
- Set practical small steps for the student to work towards their goals.
- Support them along this journey, check in regularly and re-adjust goals if required.

When reading the reports, parents and carers need to keep in mind that the 'C' grade indicates that the student has met the standard expected for their age group for that subject and their learning is firmly on track. The Approaches to Learning and Report Outcomes will give valuable information about what the student knows and what they can do. This information may also identify areas in which the student needs further help or can improve.

One of the college goals for teachers this year has been improving feedback to students along the learning journey. This will continue to be a focus next year, as teachers hone their skills in the use of Canvas as a learning management platform. Research tells us that feedback to students on their learning is one of the most effective ways to improve student outcomes. Effective feedback practices provide the bridge between assessment and learning. High quality feedback can improve student learning by as much as eight months. (Reframing Feedback to Improve Teaching and Learning AITSL). For feedback to be effective, teachers carefully gauge when it is needed to promote learning and then provide strategies to help the student to improve. This will continue to be an area for teacher professional learning and professional conversations in 2018.

May I take this opportunity to wish all our families a happy and joy-filled Christmas. For as Pope Francis tells us Christmas is joy, religious joy, an inner joy of light and peace. May the happiness of Jesus' coming surround you this Christmas season.

## **Approaches to Learning**

During Studies Coordinators meetings this semester the new reporting system has been evaluated. An analysis was carried out of the grades awarded in Semester 1 in comparison with the subject outcome levels of achievement, across various subjects and year groups. These results were shared with teachers at a Staff Meeting and discussed at Departmental Meetings to ensure alignment and consistency in assessment and the decisions about the final grades awarded.

The Approaches to Learning were also discussed. In devising the new report format, teachers considered the General Capabilities in the Australian Curriculum, as these play a significant role in equipping young Australians to live and work successfully in the twenty-first century. These capabilities were used as the basis for the learning approaches and encompasses skills, behaviours and dispositions (ACARA General Capabilities). Pisa testing also focuses on students' approaches to learning, as research suggests that how students regulate their learning and use appropriate strategies influences their achievement; with a 'particularly strong association between approaches to learning and performance' (PISA)

The skills that are the basis of the Approaches to Learning provide a solid foundation for independent learning and for working collaboratively with others. These skills can be learned and taught so that student can improve with practice. The approaches also provide a common language for students and teachers to use and reflect on during the process of learning and are very helpful in giving students feedback so they can improve and grow.

On the following page is a document that lists the approaches and includes brief descriptors to illustrate the learning behaviours teachers look for in making decisions about a student's progress in using the Approaches to Learning.





#### STUDENT APPROACHES TO LEARNING

- 1. Displays critical thinking and problem-solving skills
  - Applies logic to solving problems.
- Develops original ideas and creative approaches to solve problems.
  - Applies successful strategies to new problems.
    - Generates questions for further inquiry.
- 2. Uses subject specific language confidently for learning and communicating
- Understands subject specific terminology and uses it effectively to express ideas.
  - Communicates in written formats with a high degree of grammatical accuracy.
    - Expresses ideas fluently and clearly.
  - 3. Shows respect for the learning environment including responsible use of ICT
    - Uses learning materials and resources responsibly.
    - Respects the rights, property and opinions of others.
    - Follows the College Guidelines in the correct use of ICT.
- 4. Positively contributes to the learning environment and works collaboratively with peers
  - Listens to, acknowledges and considers differing opinions.
  - Contributes and shares information and ideas to the class and groups.
  - Participates in group activities, working respectfully and cooperatively with peers.
    - 5. Is prepared, punctual and has a positive attitude to learning
    - Arrives to lessons on time and with the required class materials.
  - Approaches lessons and activities positively, putting forward a consistent effort.
    - 6. Behaves appropriately in class
    - Acts respectfully, responsibly and safely in lessons.
    - Follows routines and instructions without supervision.
  - Responds and participates in a variety of learning activities in a positive manner.
    - 7. Meets classroom and assessment deadlines
    - Uses class time effectively and efficiently to complete set tasks.
      - Submits assessment tasks on time.

On Wednesday 8th November Mr Peter Marrapodi and Mrs Elissa Chartres coached our Boys Super 8s Cricket teams.



### **School Student Transport Scheme**

This is a reminder regarding the School Student Transport Scheme (SSTS) and students progressing from year 2 to 3 and year 6 to 7.

We have made some improvements to our system which now means that students who are progressing to year 3 and year 7 do not need to reapply if they meet the following three conditions:



- are continuing at the same school
- are residing at the same address
- have not been sent an expiry notification from Transport for NSW.

The system has automatically validated a student's ongoing eligibility if they're at the same school and progressing to year 3 and year 7. Where a student met the new eligibility the system has updated their entitlement and card. If they didn't meet the new eligibility, they would have been sent an expiry notification.
